

City prepared for affordable water fight

ALTERNATIVE WATER IS A PHRASE THAT HAS big implications for the City of Deltona. Deltona water comes from 29 wells all pumping within Deltona's City limits.

Deltona will need additional water in the near future and City staff has been in the process of renewing our Consumptive Use Permit or CUP which is regulated by the St. Johns River Water Management District.

The SJRWMD is requiring communities to work together to share water and to plan for where they will get additional water in the future. So how can area governments collectively get more water for our residents?

Here's one option: Recently Seminole County received permission from the SJRWMD to draw water from the St. Johns River. Seminole is planning to build a facility to do so and has asked area municipalities to share in the cost for this facility and then to also buy water from them. The Deltona City Commission declined to enter into what's being called the Yankee Lake agreement and has taken the stance that, quite frankly, Deltona can't afford Yankee Lake. Other cities have agreed.

But where will we get the water from? Partnering with Volusia and Flagler County governments for a desalination plant is another idea. Desalination refers to the removal of salt and minerals from seawater. The largest desalination plant in the United States is in Tampa Bay. The plant began desalinating 25 million gallons of water per day in December 2007. This project would also require the construction of a massive piping structure, criss-crossing Volusia County to get water to West Volusia. Estimates are this is a billion dollar project.

The bright spot, in our search for additional water, is that West Volusia cities and Volusia County are communicating and are eager to work together to bring affordable water to our residents. We will work together in the future when we petition the SJRWMD. A hydrogeologist has been hired by the collective group to study ground level models from within our entities. If we can prove to the District that West Volusia wells do not have a negative impact on area springs, Blue Springs for example, we will be granted permission to use alternative water supplies. The goal is to continue to provide affordable, quality water to our residents and it could be a very uphill battle but it's one we will fight.


Fire Assessment brings needed transparency for City fees

IN RESPONSE TO THE TOUGH ECONOMIC ENVIRONMENT AND TO provide more transparency related to the actual cost for fire services, the City Commission has directed staff to provide information concerning the feasibility of implementing a Special Fire Assessment District to establish a stable and consistent source of revenue that directly pays for the fire services provided to the residents of the City. This Special Assessment District (SAD) will allow the residents of Deltona to clearly dictate the Level of Service (LOS) desired.

The City has hired Burton and Associates to assist in determining the cost per structure based on the LOS desired while creating a method of identifying a fee in a fair and equitable manner to all taxpayers.

The fire assessment fee can only be used to fund fire protection. The fee would be collected annually via the annual tax bill in November of each year from the Volusia County Property Appraiser. A reduction in the "roll-back" millage rate may be considered to offset the SAD.

More information will be provided in July through a Public Forum. There are still unanswered questions regarding the actual amount of the fee and the issue of equitable


Fresh produce, plants and cut flowers are available from 8 a.m. until noon every Saturday in the parking lot at City Hall, 2345 Providence Blvd.

The Deltona Fire Department provides fire, emergency medical services, special operations and hazardous material responses as first responders to area residents. The Fire Department also provides 911 emergency communications, emergency management, public education and information services.

Currently these services are provided from four facilities with four engine companies, one aerial ladder company and one rescue unit serving our approximately 86,000 residents. Each engine company is staffed with at least three personnel consisting of a minimum of one EMT and Paramedic. Last year the Fire Department responded to more than 8,000 calls for service and the Communications Center answered more than 11,000 emergency calls for Deltona and Orange City.

Law enforcement update: How to recognize lottery scams, cons

REMEMBER THESE RULES: FIRST, NOTHING IS for free. Second, if it sounds too good to be true, IT IS. And lastly, never redeem a lottery ticket for a stranger.

You may have seen something like this: Congratulations!

You may receive a certified check for up to \$400,000 in cash. One Lump Sum! Your odds to win are one in six. Hundreds of U.S. citizens win every week using our secret system! You can win as much as you want!

Remember, no legitimate lottery will ever notify you that you won. They do not work that way.

What is a lottery?

Unlike a sweepstakes, a lottery is a promotional device by which items of value (prizes) are awarded to members of the public by chance, but which requires some form of payment to participate. In other words you have to buy a ticket in order to have won a lottery. In other words--no matter what anyone tells you--you have to buy a lottery ticket to win a lottery.

How does a lottery scam work?

Victims typically are notified they have won a lottery, yet have to pay transfer fees, taxes or provide proof of their identify and or details of their bank accounts or credit cards in order to receive the "winnings." The names of these organizations change all the time (they just make up a new name when one is exposed as a fraud), although many of the notifications use similar wording.

Here's some tips to avoid a lottery scam:

1. In order to win a legitimate lottery a person has to have entered to win a lottery.
2. In almost all cases, a ticket must be purchased in order for a lottery to be legitimate.
3. In a legitimate lottery, winners never have to pay in order to collect winnings and taxes are required only after winnings are received. Legitimate lotteries do not collect fees.
4. Lottery winners are not notified but someone with a

winning lottery ticket has to notify the entity that they have one. If someone notifies you by e-mail or phone that you have won a lottery, it is not likely legitimate.

5. It is illegal under federal law to play any foreign lottery from the United States and many other countries have similar laws.

6. Since scammers simply invent new names for their fake lottery scams, it is more accurate to say that if you do not see the lottery on the list of legitimate lotteries, it is probably a scam.

How did they get my name if not through a lottery I entered?

Names and addresses of potential victims are harvested by spyware, viruses and other tools and obtained through various trade journals, business directories, magazine and newspaper advertisements, chambers of commerce and anywhere names appear on the internet (chat rooms, forums, social networking sites, etc.). Phonebooks are good resources for scammers.

Residents should keep the following warning signs in mind:

The information advises that a prize has been won but is from a lottery that an entry hasn't been filled out. The information arrives in the mail personally addressed but is post marked using bulk mail. This implies that thousands of others may have received the same notification. The information requires money up front to release your win or a administrative or processing fee. The information requests bank account, credit card details or other confidential information.

Another warning sign is a call from someone who is very excited to be talking to you or acts as if he/she is your best friend. The caller may say that a response or reply is required right away or the money will be given to someone else.



